* Numbers for bulbs are given as a guide. Plant in clumps around perennials and at the canopy edges of deciduous shrubs. For early-spring/winter flowering varieties, focus on where you will see them the most such as by regularly-used paths or from inside the house

*Agapanthus are best grown in pots where they can be moved to a sheltered spot in winter and brought out to a prominent position when actively growing. They like to be snug, so if a large pot group a couple together. They will need dividing after three or four years as they don't like to be pot-bound. Regular feeding will ensure good flowers, although young bulbs or plants may take 2-3 years to start flowering.

*Wholesale supplier www.dutchbulbs.com will sell bulbs at wholesale prices to the general public. They have minimum order sizes, which varies by product (e.g. 10, 25 bulbs etc) and may add a 'small order' charge but the wide range on offer and per bulb prices is often very good value.

**If budget allows, for the evergreen climbers look for frame-trained specimens as these will give a greater coverage from day 1 e.g. the plant will be around 120-150 height by 1m spread. You may also be able to find frame-trained Ceanothus and Chaenomeles
